

Technology of writing and its sequels

Interpretation: orality, writing, print, electronics (computer, TV, radio).

Interiority of technologies of the word.

Technology and increased attention to the self (interiorization).
In Ellul's "technological system" the verbal and intellectual and interiorizing elements seem not to be taken into consideration.

Lonergan may consider language a "technique": ^{but} it is not a technology in the ordinary sense of ~~this~~ word as involving use of elements outside ^{the} human being.

Displacement (distantiation) and interpretation.

Initial distancing by naming. Adam's naming of the animals as interpretation of his environment.

What children learn is not simply "literacy," but the behavior and values of literate cultures (which, of course, vary among themselves). See Shirley Brice Heath.
